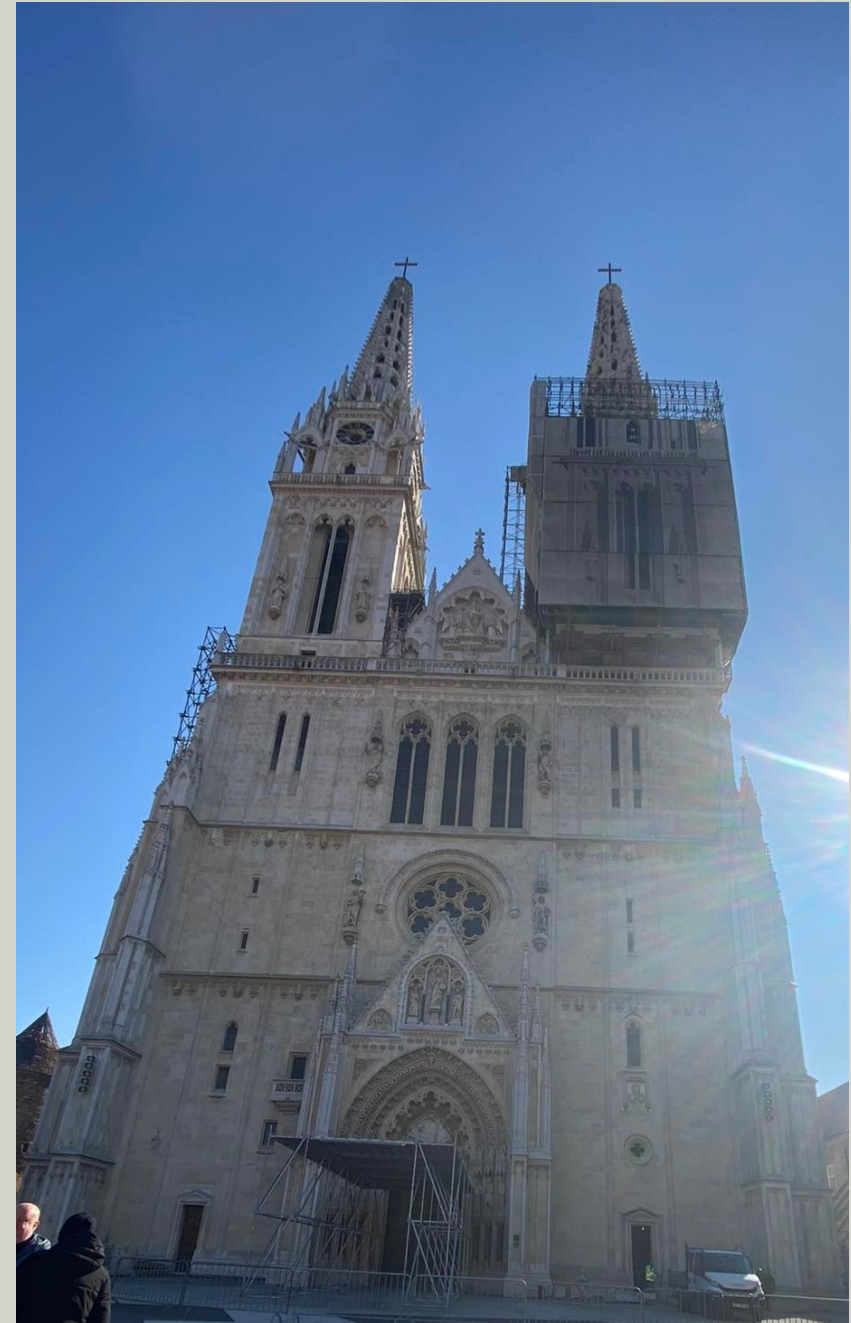
# St. Mark's Church

The Church of St. Mark is the parish church of old Zagreb, Croatia, located in St. Mark's Square. It is one of the oldest architectural monuments in Zagreb. Around the church there are the buildings of the Croatian Parliament and Croatian Government.



# Zagreb Cathedral

Zagreb Cathedral, on the Kaptol, is a Roman Catholic cathedral-church and not only the second tallest building in Croatia but also the most monumental sacral building in Gothic style southeast of the Alps. It is dedicated to the Assumption of Mary and to kings Saint Stephen and Saint Ladislaus. The cathedral is typically Gothic, as is its sacristy, which is of great architectural value.

# Nikola Tesla Technical Museum

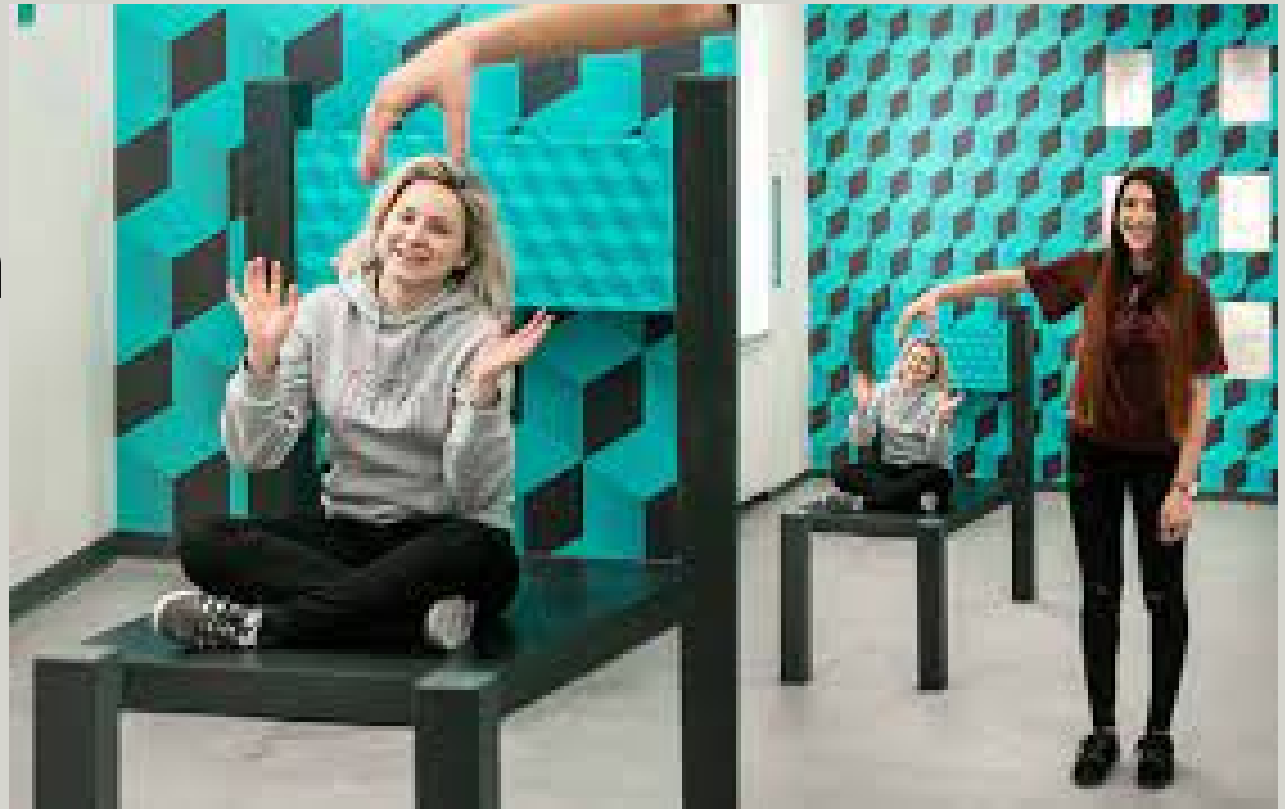

# The Stone Gate

The Stone Gate is one of the best preserved monuments of old Zagreb. It is a building built on a rectangular plan, with a tower with a tent roof. An interesting feature of the Zagreb gate is that the gates at both ends are not facing each other. The outer doors face north, while the inner doors open to the west. The Stone Gate is part of the former city wall system of Gradec, the oldest part of Zagreb. It is also the only surviving one of the four gates originally built around the old town of the Croatian capital.
